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**Course Content:** This course surveys the subfield of political science concerned with the scientific study of power, institutions, structures, and change in international relations. The class discussions will focus on debates among different theoretical approaches to the study of international relations. After taking this course students will be familiar with concepts, theories, and methods used in the study of international relations.

**Course Requirements:** *Exams* There will be four 100 point exams. All make-up exams are scheduled for Friday August 7<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 p.m. Make-up exams will only be allowed when the instructor is notified *before* the scheduled exam and only for verifiable and excusable grounds. Make-up exams are not offered for the final exam except in the most unusual of circumstances. *Students will need a scantron sheet for all exams.*

*Class Participation and attendance* including quizzes, will account for another 50 points. Make-up quizzes will not be offered. Missing more than 2 classes lowers your final grade by one-third (e.g., an A- turns into a B+). Missing more than 4 classes determines that your grade is an F. Students who are late, leave early, or disrupt the class will be marked absent.

All in-class exams and quizzes must be written in black ink, dark blue ink, or a "number 2" pencil. Exams and quizzes not conforming to this requirement will not be graded. Students who do not exercise legible penmanship will be penalized on their exam and quiz grades.

Disruptions – such as using a cell phone, text messenger, pager, music player, computer or other device – will have a deleterious effect on your participation grade. *The instructor requires all such devices to be switched off during class.* Failure to abide by this will result in a 5 percent penalty on your final grade per instance. Electronic devices, including language translation equipment, may not be used during exams. Recording devices may not be used at anytime; if any unauthorized recording is made and distributed you will be subject to civil suit. If you use a computer to take notes the instructor reserves the right to obtain a copy of your notes within 24 hours of the request; failure to comply with this will result in a failing grade for the course.
